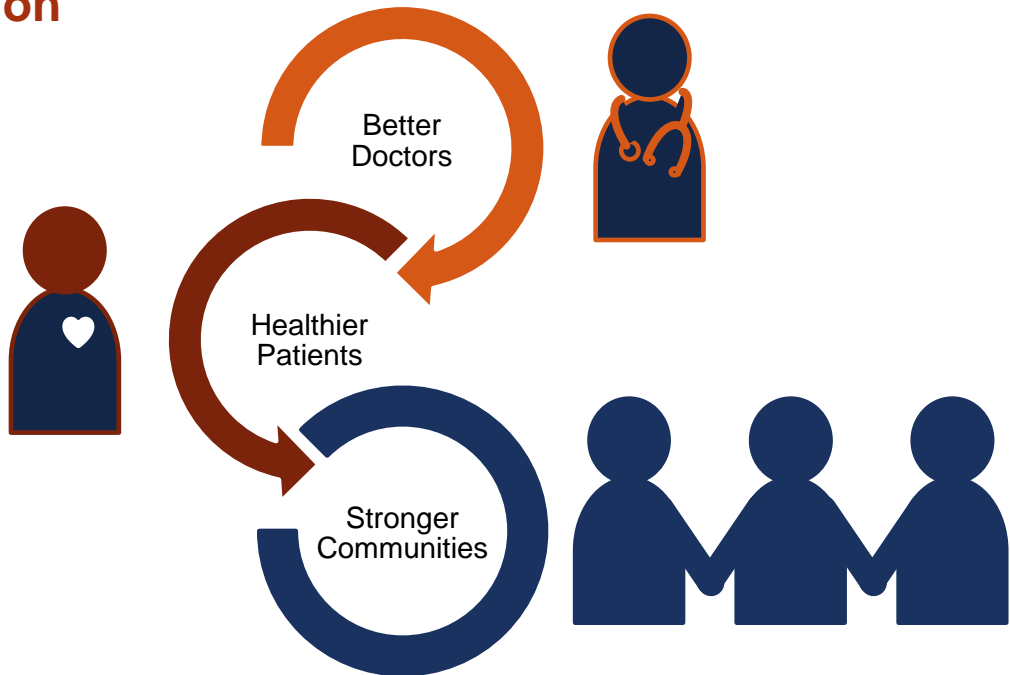

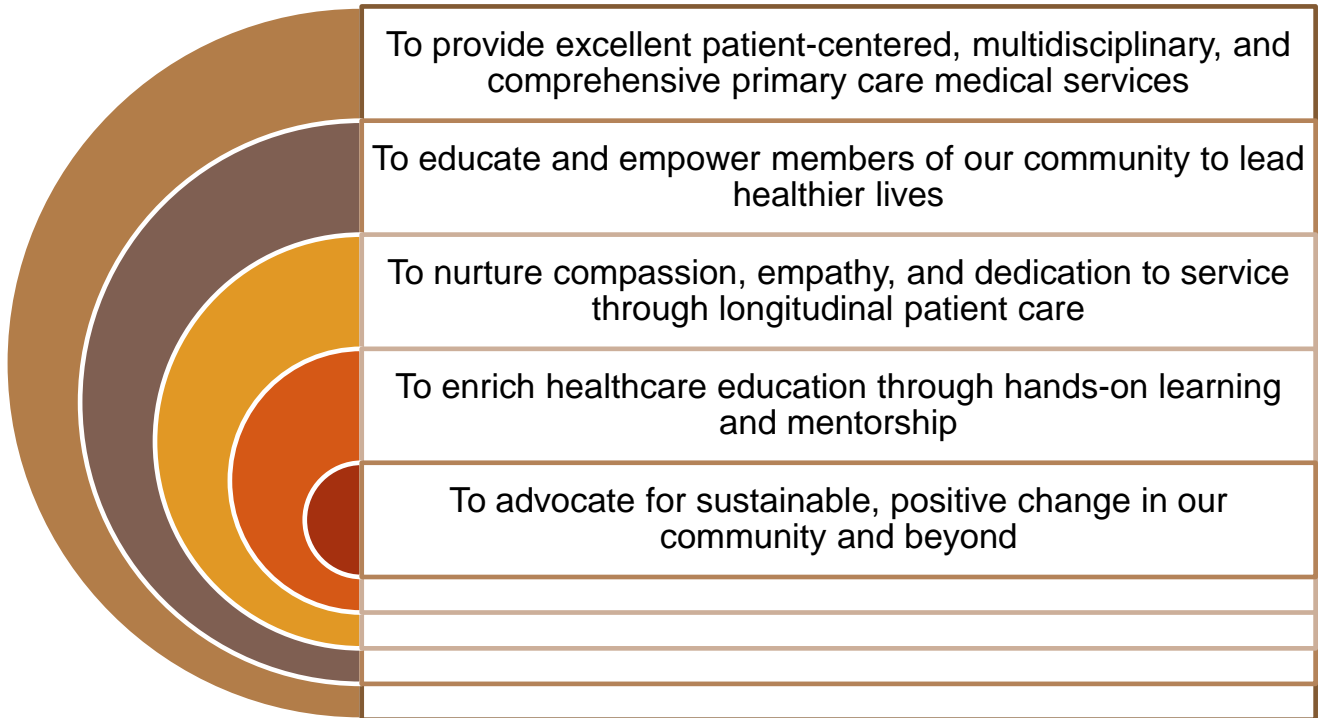
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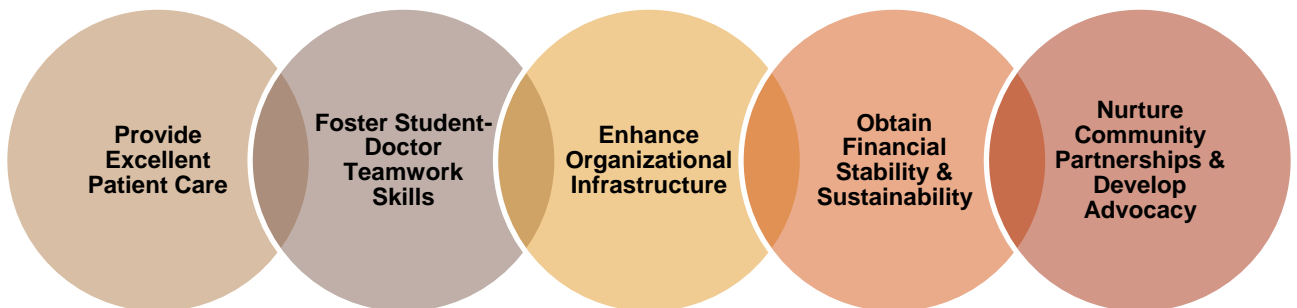

Who We Are:

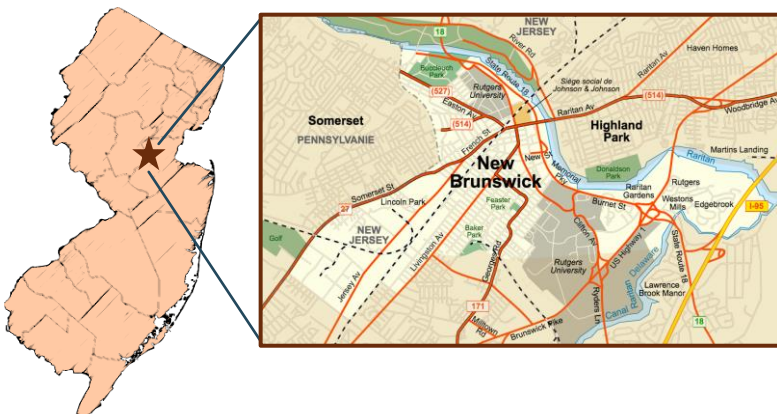
- We are HIPHOP-Promise Clinic, a student-run free clinic that aims to provide free primary care to the uninsured clients of Elijah’s Promise Community Kitchen in New Brunswick, NJ.
- We are a community of medical students, volunteer faculty physicians, and local partners dedicated to providing patient-centered, quality primary care services.
- We are a source of accessible healthcare for our patients and a place for student-doctors to learn from and give back to the local community.

What We Do:

- EDUCATION AND EMPOWERMENT of clients of Elijah’s Promise Community Kitchen to lead healthier lives through health literacy initiatives
- COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT through service-learning aimed at teaching future physicians the importance of continuity of care, teamwork, advocacy, innovation, and leadership
- PATIENT AND PEER EDUCATION through collaborative learning and exchange between students at different stages of their medical school education

Our Model:

- Continuity of Care
 - Each new patient at HIPHOP-Promise Clinic is paired with a team of medical students. Under the direct supervision of volunteer clinical faculty from Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, student-doctor teams are responsible for their assigned patient’s care throughout their time in medical school, ensuring continuity.
- Team-Based Care
 - Students of medicine, pharmacy, and social work team up to provide holistic care for their patients.

A Message from A Faculty Advisor

Robert Wood Johnson Medical School is dedicated to excellence in medical education and to develop ethical and culturally competent physicians; HIPHOP-Promise Clinic inspires learners toward lifelong commitment. The challenge of the pandemic created a new platform for the 181 student doctors of MS1-MS4 classes and 82 steering committee members in 12 committees during 2021 to 2022.

We Care

We strive to provide free continuity primary care service for uninsured patients. As soon as free COVID vaccines became available at E.B. Chandler Health Center, we coordinated with the RWJMS Student Vaccine Clinic to give it and the influenza vaccine to Promise Clinic patients. As the end of the pandemic neared, we resumed psychological counseling, social needs assessment, and vision screening, PAP, mammogram and stool screenings. We initiated dermatological consultation with Dr. Pappert on 2/17/22; and welcomed the HIPHOP-Asylum Clinic to the clinical site in May 2022.

We Cultivate

We prepare learners to become resilient and adaptable; and prepare leaders to teach, mentor and disseminate in the following courses: Physicianship-I, Promise Clinic administrative elective, Promise Clinic Continuity III, Promise Clinic Continuity IV, HIPHOP-Promise Clinic Student Interpreter Elective. Five students were nominated by peers to be inducted into the Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society for their compassionate commitment: Catherine Morris, Cameron Schmidt, Fady Soliman, Jacob Jaslove, and Wilfrido Castillo.

Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen



Recipients of Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen services are eligible, and actively recruited, for care at the Promise Clinic. Elijah's Promise is a dynamic organization that helps low-income individuals by providing nutritious meals, a broad range of social services, culinary arts training, and health screenings. Elijah's Promise has been a wonderful partner and advocate for the community. Students staff a booth at the community kitchen twice a week to provide blood pressure screenings. Our student-doctors also provide health education for the members of the community through teaching sessions. Our partnership with Elijah's Promise enables community members to engage in health maintenance activities and to monitor their health weekly.

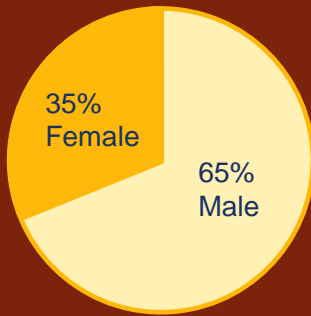

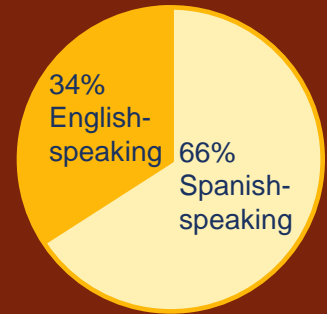

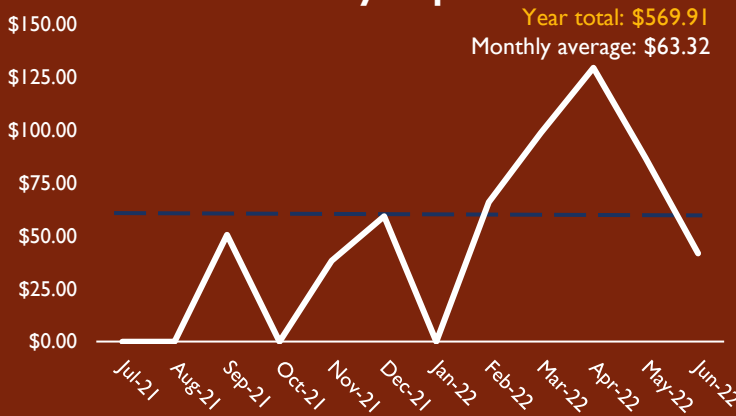

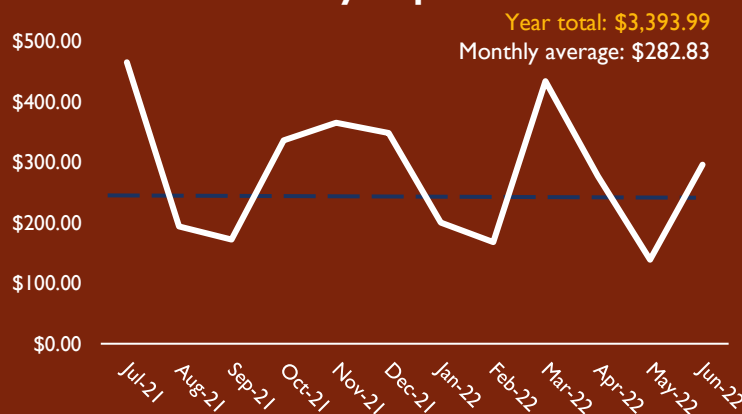

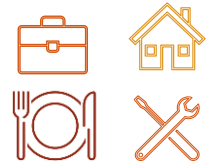

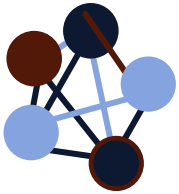


Promise Clinic Subcommittees



Operations:

- Oversee all Promise Clinic activities as clinic directors, managers, schedulers, and first-year representatives
- Act as liaisons between steering committees, student-doctors, preceptors, faculty advisors, and clinic staff
- Manage the flow of clinic weekly and collaborate to realize long-term goals for Promise Clinic



Social Needs:

- Collaborate with the Rutgers School of Social Work and student-doctors to identify patients' social needs, including housing insecurity, food insecurity, and unmet educational needs
- Work with community partners to connect patients with local resources to alleviate these pressures with the goal of improving overall health and wellness

Community Outreach:



- Collaborate with Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen, other community-based partners, and other steering committees to facilitate patient recruitment and ensure patient follow-up
- Coordinate bi-weekly screening efforts at Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen and work to improve the health of the population by developing public health education materials and programs
- Organize clinic-wide interventions to target prevalent diseases by administering and analyzing the annual Patient Demographic Survey and encourage student-doctors to practice preventative medicine

Lab:



- Manage all lab testing during clinic hours, including blood draws, urine samples, finger stick glucose, and other lab procedures
- Collaborate with the Middlesex County Department of Health to provide mammography, pap smear, and colon cancer screening for patients through the CEED (Cancer Education and Early Detection) Program



Specialty Care:

- Work to increase the breadth of specialized medical resources available to Promise Clinic patients and to streamline the process of obtaining care
- Provide student-doctor teams with specialists' contact information and assist with the Charity Care program onsite



Communications:

- Manage contact with all Promise Clinic patients, including Spanish-speaking patients
- Keep in touch with patients regarding appointments and outpatient care, and work closely with clinic schedulers to arrange new patient appointments and follow-up appointments
- Serve as interpreters for Spanish-speaking patients and recruit others to serve as interpreters through a Student Interpreter Program



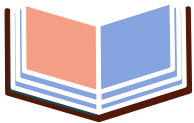
Pharmacy:

- Provide patients with prescriptions and vouchers to obtain medication from a local pharmacy at no cost to the patient
- Provide onsite assistance to student-doctor teams in reviewing patient medications for potential drug interactions and side effects
- Guide teams in getting their patients into appropriate Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs)



Quality Improvement:

- Identify and target areas where patient safety at the greatest risk, which includes overall clinic administration and specific team practices
- Improve the efficiency and production of Promise Clinic by using data from student-doctor visits to implement Best Practices
- Serve as a central source of information for many Promise Clinic projects



Education:

- Make the Promise Clinic a model learning experience for student-doctors
- Maintain student attendance records for patient appointments and teaching sessions
- Act as a liaison between the steering committees and medical school staff regarding student completion of requirements



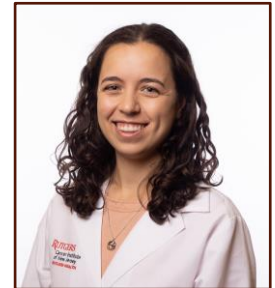
Fundraising & Finance

- Manage the clinic budget and monitor fundraising income and expenses
- Coordinate fundraising efforts within the community with the goal to reach financial sustainability and continue providing patients with free healthcare

Reflection from a Student Doctor-Steering Committee Member

Eleanor Agosta has served on the Operations Steering Committee and as a student doctor at Promise Clinic. She is also part of the RWJ MD/PhD program. The following is a reflection on her experiences:

Promise Clinic has given me so much as a student and I wish I could say that I was our clinic's biggest cheerleader, but that title belongs to the patient my team has been seeing for the past four years. My first appointment with our patient at Promise Clinic was my first patient appointment ever as a medical student. I was shaky when I was helping out with the history and the physical exam, switching in and out of Spanish when my vocabulary couldn't keep up. Later in the appointment, the more senior members of the team went to present to the attending and me and our student interpreter stayed back to get to know our patient better. Once we started chatting, I felt myself relax and the conversation flowed naturally to him telling us about his life.



He immigrated from Mexico on his own, without his wife and kids, and it was years before he found Promise Clinic. He told us about how when he first came to our clinic, he had several unmanaged chronic medical conditions since he is ineligible for health insurance. He talked about how much he misses his family and showed us photos of his two granddaughters who he has watched grow up through a phone screen. You would think that with all that he would be somber when talking about his family or frustrated with the state of medical care in the United States, but nothing could not be further from his outlook.

Whenever we do our routine screens for depression and anxiety, he gives us a lecture. It is usually some version of "I don't understand when people complain all the time saying my car is bad, my house is bad, I would say at least I have a car, at least I have a house!" He takes every twist and turn in his medical care as an opportunity to learn and improve his health and is meticulous with the instructions we give him. He participates in every survey and extra program that is offered because he wants to do everything he can to show how grateful he is for Promise Clinic. It is so gratifying to see his health improve over time and the night and day difference from when he first started coming to clinic five years ago (and how much his granddaughters have grown!)

I am so grateful to be part of not only my student doctor team, but of the Operations Committee where I work alongside incredibly talented and dedicated students every week to make sure our patients get the best quality healthcare we can provide. My work at Promise Clinic has kept me grounded through the didactic years of medical school and my PhD research years where I have often felt far away from the values that brought me to medical school in the first place. Promise Clinic allows me to practice my commitment of service to others and build meaningful connections both within and beyond the medical school community. Most importantly, my work at Promise Clinic is an active commitment to ensure we are worthy of the praise my patient has for our clinic.
