The University of Zaragoza, School of Medicine hosted us for a 4-week hospital immersion program.

My Objectives:

- Practice physical exam skills
- Explore various medical specialties
- Enhance medical Spanish proficiency
- Broaden cultural competency/ humility


Zaragoza, Aragon, Spain

- Population: 666,880 (2018)
- Official Language: Spanish

Healthcare in Spain

- Population: 47,615,034 (2020)
- Universal Healthcare, paid by Taxes. Known as the National Health System (Sistema National de Salud, SNS).
- Health spending % of GDP: 9.1%
- Life expectancy: 85.7 years (Female) and 80.7 years (Male)
- Relative poverty rate: 20.7% (2020)
- In 2019, 0.2% of the population reported unmet medical needs due to cost, distance, or wait time.



Family Medicine Clinic – Centro de Salud Arrabal

- Shadowed family medicine doctor and resident during patient visits. They gave us insight into the Spanish medical education system and the Spanish healthcare system.
- In comparison to the US, Spain has a universal healthcare system (SNS) which is regarded as a public service. Patients are assigned a local clinic and family doctor, emphasizing the importance of continuity of care. Nurses have their own office and play a vital role in routine testing and patient care. Spain does not have a strong referral culture.
- Residents ran the skin clinic. Patients presented with various skin concerns (skin tags, fibromas, warts, etc.). We assisted with cryotherapy and the electrical surgical scalpel.

Rural Medicine Clinic — Catalyud, Miedes, and Ruesca

- We shadowed Dr. Marta Miedes, the family medicine doctor assigned to the surrounding farming pueblos of Miedes and Ruesca (combined population of 500).
- Older patient population with knee/hip pain, arthritis, and diabetes.
- We did a house visit for a 90-yr old M with Alzheimer's disease for wound care of multiple bed sores.

• During cultivating season, Romanian immigrants work at farms. Immigrants living in Spain >3 mos. have access to care.



OB/GYN Department – Hospital Clinico Universitario Lozano Blesa


- Everyday, I shadowed a different doctor in various clinics within the department: Obstetrics Clinic, Hysteroscopy Clinic, Endometriosis Clinic, Infertility Clinic, Breast Clinic, Cervical Pathology Clinic, ECHO Clinic, and scheduled C-sections.
- *Infertility Clinic:* SNS covers pregnancy care, infertility consultations, 4-6 cycles of insemination, sperm and ovary donation, and IVF for women <40 yrs. and <32 BMI.
- *Breast Clinic:* National breast cancer screening program. SNS covers transgender care, hormone replacement, and chest masculinization reconstruction.
- *Cervical Pathology Clinic:* National cervical cancer screening done by nurses. SNS covers HPV vaccine only for 12 to 13-year-olds, or during an active HPV infection.
- Clinical skills gained: Used a transvaginal ultrasound to visualize the uterus, bladder and ovaries, and to identify the trilaminar endometrium; detected the heartbeat of an 8-week fetus via ultrasound; inserted a speculum; preformed a manual pelvic exam and breast exam.
- Procedures observed: transvaginal ultrasound, ECHO, hysteroscopy, insemination, colposcopy, C-section, mastitis drainage, and hysterosalpingography.

- Weekdays:


8 am - 2 pm: Clinic
