

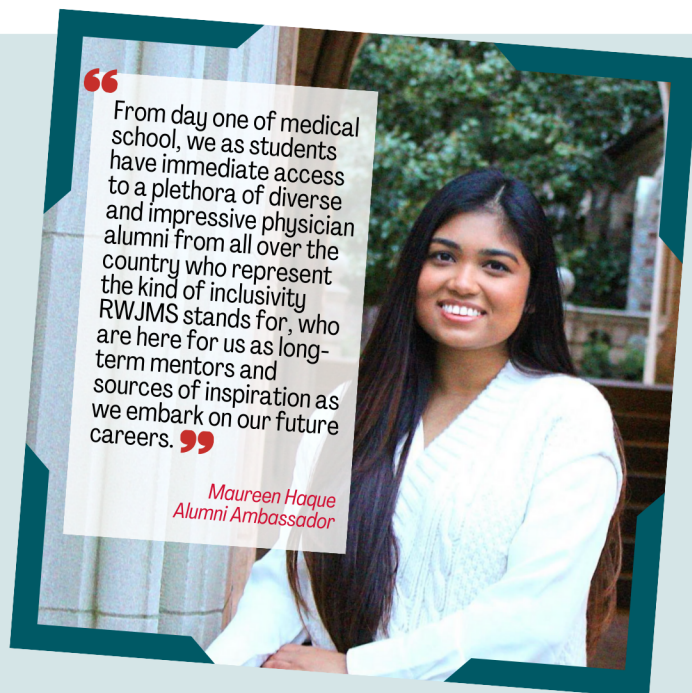
PARTICIPATING IN GROUNDBREAKING RESEARCH



Medical students across all years have opportunities to conduct research with more than **200** internationally recognized physicians and scientists in areas such as:

- Addiction
- Cancer
- Cardiovascular disease
- Child health disorders, including autism
- Foundational biomedical research
- Microbiome
- Metabolic disorders, including diabetes
- Neurological disease, including multiple sclerosis
- Respiratory disease, including asthma
- Reproductive health
- Transgender health
- Women's health

Summer Research Fellowships enable students to enhance their analytical and lab skills. Medical students also have co-authored articles in peer-reviewed journals, as well as presented research findings at national conferences.

Our "5 C's" curriculum offers academic, wellness, and social support to all our students. The faculty ensure the curriculum is aimed to support learning through multiple modalities by connecting students to the patient/physician experience, case-based learning through large group question sessions, and a dedicated time to focus on physician skills. Experiential learning is included from the beginning of your first year. The 5 C's curriculum is composed of three phases: 18-month pre-clerkship, clerkship phase, and advanced clinical experiences. Eric B. Chandler Health Center:

A federally qualified community health center owned by the medical school and operated jointly with a community board.

Homeless and Indigent Population Health Outreach Project (HIPHOP):

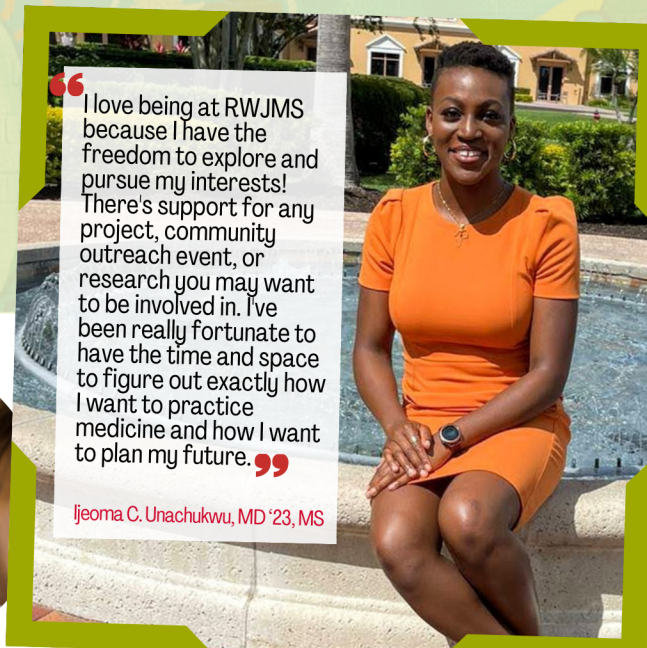
HIPHOP -- Community Health Initiative:
The student-directed HIPHOP is in its 31st year of service, supervised and supported by medical school faculty and staff. HIPHOP hosts and partners with the community in more than 40 outreach programs and events yearly, including food banks, mentoring/tutoring, health preventive education programs, and much more.

HIPHOP -- Asylum Clinic:

The Asylum Clinic is a group of volunteer healthcare providers and students who conduct forensic medical and psychiatric evaluations for persecuted individuals. This service is provided to victims of torture from countries across the globe who are seeking asylum on multiple grounds, including persecution due to race, gender, religion, sexual orientation and political affiliation. Our asylum clinic volunteer providers and student scribes meet with clients to conduct forensic medical evaluations and to prepare a medical affidavit in support of a client's asylum application. Asylum seekers with legal representation and forensic medical affidavits are more than twice as likely to be granted asylum.

HIPHOP -- Promise Clinic:

Our student-run health clinic, which is faculty advised and integrated through all four years of medical school, provides free primary care to clients of a local community soup kitchen who are uninsured and many of whom have common chronic conditions.



Global Health:

Faculty mentor students pursuing global health knowledge and experience both locally and globally.

Students can participate in electives in many countries.
