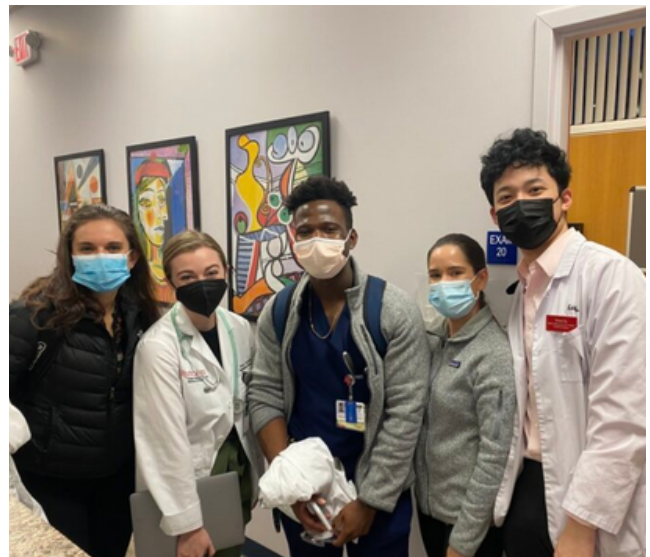

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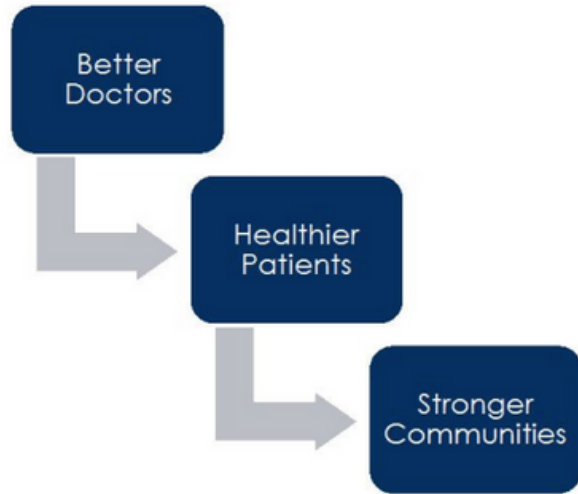
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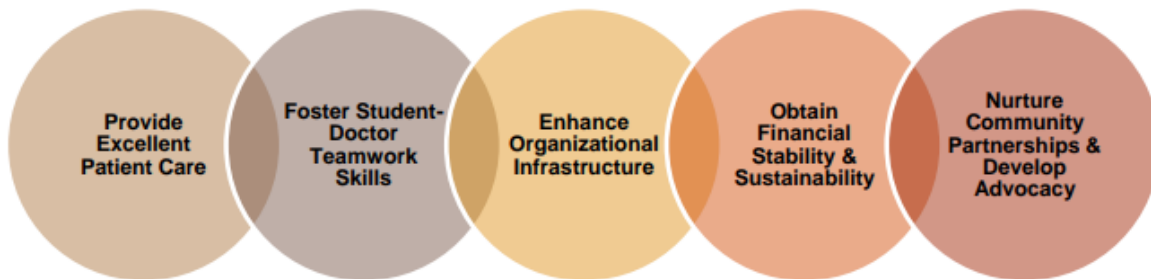

- We are HIPHOP-Promise Clinic, a student-run free clinic that aims to provide free primary care to the uninsured clients of Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen in New Brunswick, NJ.
- We are a community of medical students, volunteer faculty physicians, and local partners dedicated to providing patient-centered, quality primary care services.
- We are a source of accessible healthcare for our patients and a place for student doctors to learn from and give back to the local community.

What We Do:

- **Education** and **empowerment** of clients of Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen to lead healthier lives through health literacy initiatives
- **Community engagement** through service-learning aimed at teaching future physicians the importance of continuity of care, teamwork, advocacy, innovation, and leadership
- **Patient and peer education** through collaborative learning and exchange between students at different stages of their medical school education

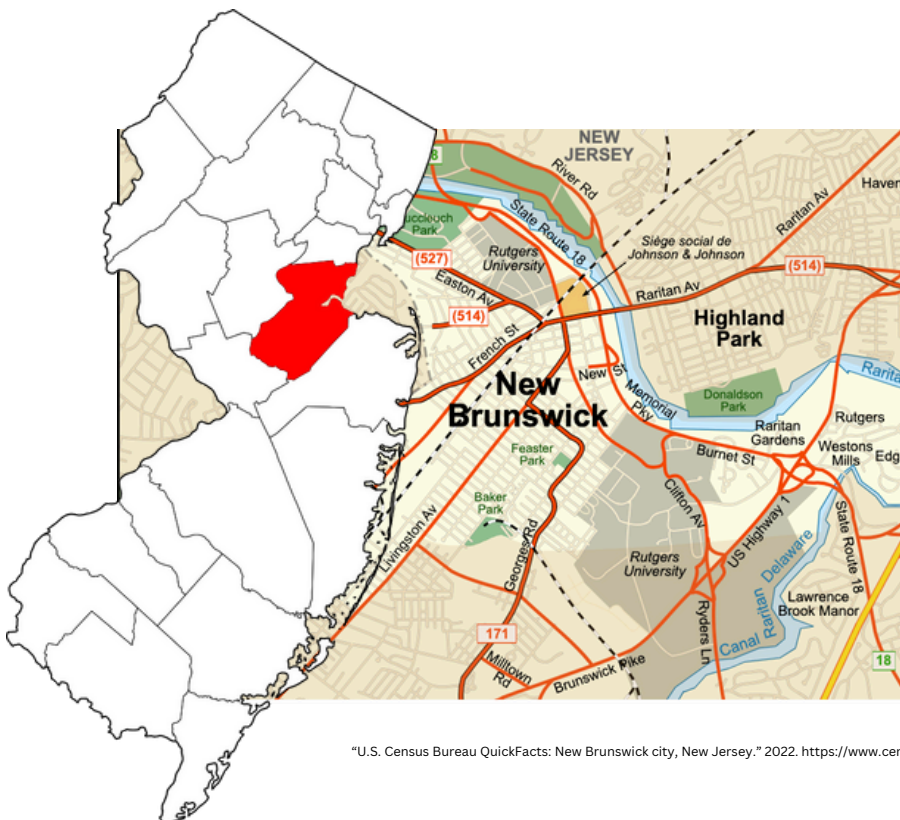
Our Model

Continuity of Care

- Each new patient at HIPHOP-Promise Clinic Is paired with a team of medical students. Under the supervision of volunteer clinical faculty from Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, student-doctor teams are responsible for their assigned patient's care throughout their time In medical school, ensuring continuity

Team-based Care

- Students of medicine, pharmacy, and social work team up to provide holistic care for their patients

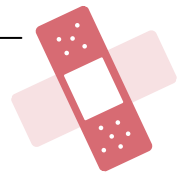

A WORD FROM A FACULTY ADVISOR

Every Thursday evening, I am grateful to student doctors, steering committees, managers and directors for providing care to our patients; for E.B. Chandler Health Center to provide a home base for our operation; and for the mission of Robert Wood Johnson Medical School to nurture future physicians.

We count our blessings far beyond Thanksgiving and throughout the year:

- Indigent Patient Laboratory Services Agreement was signed with Laboratory Corporation of America Holdings to cover the cost of laboratory tests.
- “HIPHOP Promise Clinic” - EPIC hyperspace officially went live on 4/29/23, after a year-long effort led by our student directors Michael Enich and Erini Papas and the entire EPIC team. The electronic medical records of our patients are now accessible by healthcare teams of the emergency room and other specialties for better collaborative care.
- Rutgers Project ECHO – Diabetes -Related Chronic Kidney Disease was the first time a student-run clinic participated bi-weekly and presented and received consultation among NJ healthcare practitioners, led by Promise Clinic - Pharmacy Committee and student doctors. This inspired us to propose the Diabetes Action Plan for the next year.

The temporary relocation to Family Medicine at Monument Square during the 5½ months of renovation of E. B. Chandler Health Center was a seamless transition through the commitment of leadership, staff, faculty, residents, and students. The one-block distance was convenient for our patients; it increased the mutual understanding of the practices of private vs. federally qualified vs. student-run clinics. Now that we have returned to the E. B. Chandler Health Center, we are even more appreciative of their past 11 years of support of Promise Clinic.

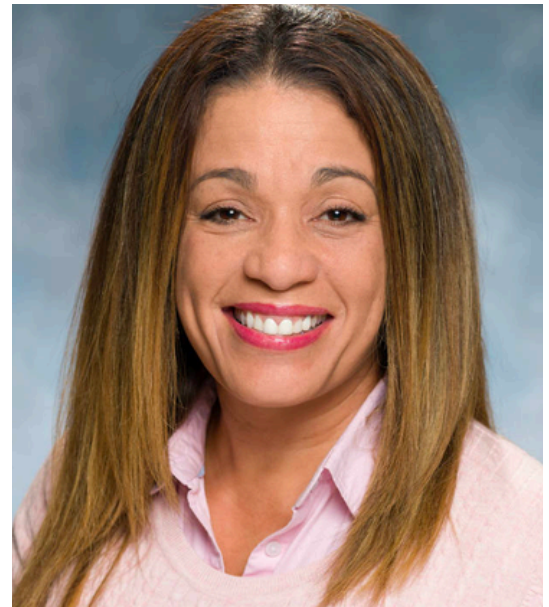

Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen

Recipients of Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen services are eligible, and actively recruited, for care at the Promise Clinic. Elijah's Promise is a dynamic organization that helps low-income individuals by providing nutritious meals, a broad range of social services, culinary arts training, and health screenings. Elijah's Promise has been a wonderful partner and advocate for the community. Students staff a booth at the community kitchen twice a week to provide blood pressure screenings. Our student-doctors also provide health education for the members of the community through teaching sessions. Our partnership with Elijah's Promise enables community members to engage in health maintenance activities and to monitor their health weekly.

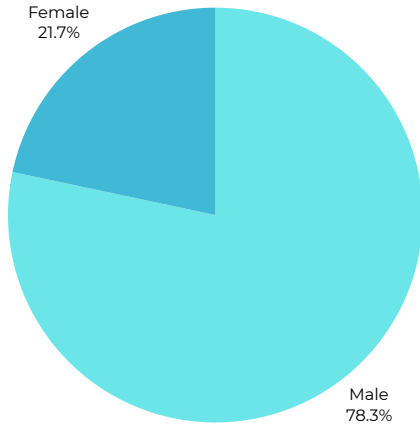

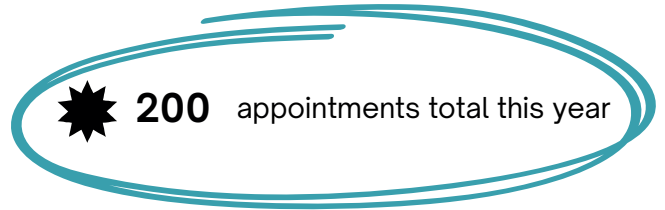

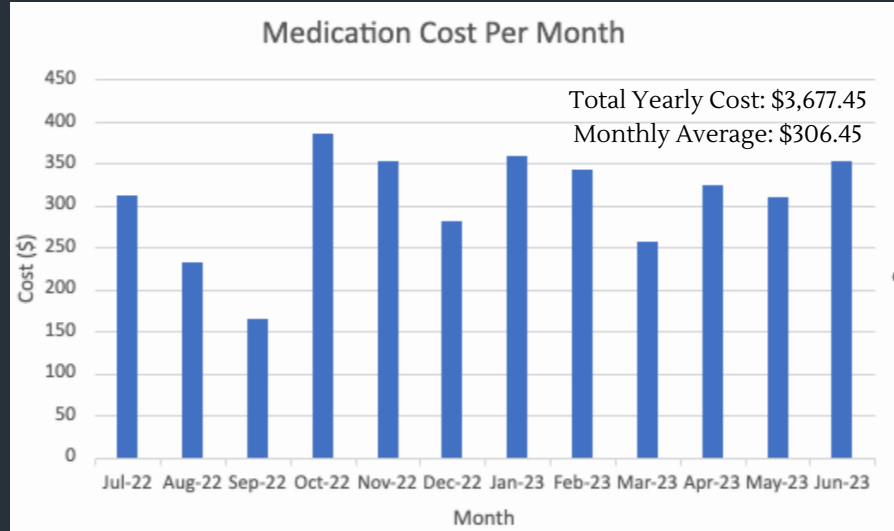

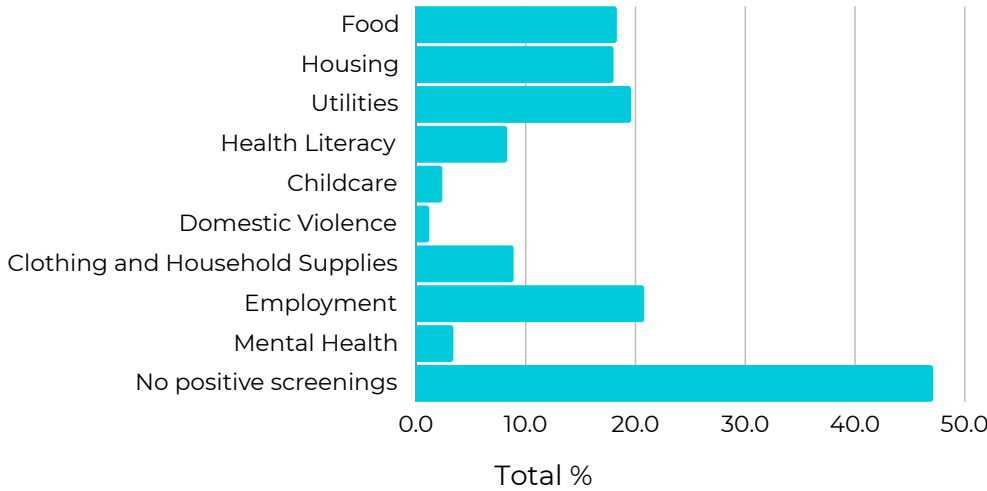

New Patients Recruited

Veggie Rx is underway to provide healthy fruits and vegetables to New Brunswick’s poor and low-income residents. More than a lifeline to food, the program also helps to create awareness about the connections between food and health, and it provides tangible ways for residents to take care of their health. Established in 2018, Veggie Rx represents a partnership among several health-oriented community programs that serve the city’s most vulnerable residents: New Brunswick Community Farmers’ Market, Robert Wood Johnson Medical School’s HIPHOP Promise Clinic, and Elijah’s Promise community kitchen.



STUDENT REFLECTION

Being a part of Promise Clinic was one of the most meaningful experiences of my medical school trajectory, and honestly ensured the foundation for what I hope is a career working with the underserved. Personally and professionally I was part of so many milestones here: I saw my very first patient. I piloted my first health program, published my first paper, navigated a clinic through a global pandemic, helped get us on Epic, moved us to OneDrive, physically moved our clinic location somewhere else and back (not even counting virtual care!). I did my first health counseling, did my first suicide screen, cautioned a patient for not taking their medications, handed someone crying a tissue. I encountered incredible faculty and volunteers in whom I could see a similar commitment to the underserved, be they social workers, students, clinicians, community members, staff or faculty (with special thanks to Dr. Lin for all her leadership and mentorship, and Dr. Jahn and Susan for every time I sent them a left-field email about community health). I helped-- with a whole team of people-- run an organization! And along the way learned so much about community partnerships, clinical logistics, sending emails, holding trainings, su-peer-ving, creating teams, navigating bureaucracy for patients, and, most importantly, how to provide clinical care to people without a lot of medical resources. I would never want to assume a lasting impact but hope that I helped our clinic function a little clearer and easier, with sustainable processes that make it manageable to provide this care and give our patients the services they need



I don't think I'll ever forget that first patient; they had been living in the woods for many years and, after a health scare, decided it was time to reconnect with not only medical care but the whole world; I still think about that almost magical feeling during the encounter where I put my white coat on and a person trusted me enough to share their experience with me. They let me ask questions and answered honestly, all because of my costume of a stethoscope and white coat. I'm grateful Promise Clinic was the place where I got to feel that awe and wonder, and hope that the times along the way where I feel it again I'll remember my time here.

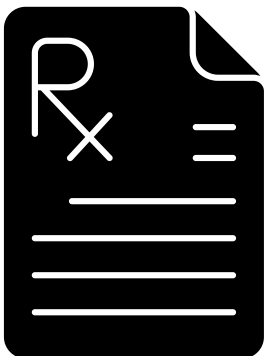

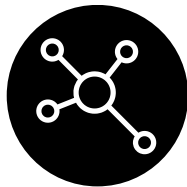

SUBCOMMITTEES



OPERATIONS

- Oversee all Promise Clinic activities as clinic directors, managers, schedulers, and first-year representatives
- Act as liaisons between steering committees, student-doctors, preceptors, faculty advisors, and clinic staff
- Manage the flow of clinic weekly and collaborate to realize long-term goals for Promise Clinic



SOCIAL NEEDS

- Collaborate with the Rutgers School of Social Work and student-doctors to identify patients' social needs, including housing insecurity, food insecurity, and unmet educational needs
- Work with community partners to connect patients with local resources to alleviate these pressures with the goal of improving overall health and wellness



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

- Collaborate with Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen, other community-based partners, and other steering committees to facilitate patient recruitment and ensure patient follow-up
- Coordinate bi-weekly screening efforts at Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen and work to improve the health of the population by developing public health education materials and programs
- Organize clinic-wide interventions to target prevalent diseases by administering and analyzing the annual Patient Demographic Survey and encourage student-doctors to practice preventative medicine



LAB

- Manage all lab testing during clinic hours, including blood draws, urine samples, finger stick glucose, and other lab procedures
- Collaborate with the Middlesex County Department of Health to provide mammography, pap smear, and colon cancer screening for patients through the CEED (Cancer Education and Early Detection) Program



SPECIALTY CARE

- Work to increase the breadth of specialized medical resources available to Promise Clinic patients and to streamline the process of obtaining care
- Provide student-doctor teams with specialists' contact information and assist with the Charity Care program onsite



COMMUNICATIONS

- Manage contact with all Promise Clinic patients, including Spanish-speaking patients
- Keep in touch with patients regarding appointments and outpatient care, and work closely with clinic schedulers to arrange new patient appointments and follow-up appointments
- Serve as interpreters for Spanish-speaking patients and recruit others to serve as interpreters through a Student Interpreter Program



PHARMACY

- Provide patients with prescriptions and vouchers to obtain medication from a local pharmacy at no cost to the patient
- Provide onsite assistance to student-doctor teams in reviewing patient medications for potential drug interactions and side effects
- Guide teams in getting their patients into appropriate Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs)



QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

- Identify and target areas where patient safety at the greatest risk, which includes overall clinic administration and specific team practices
- Improve the efficiency and production of Promise Clinic by using data from student-doctor visits to implement Best Practices
- Serve as a central source of information for many Promise Clinic projects



EDUCATION

- Make the Promise Clinic a model learning experience for student-doctors
- Maintain student attendance records for patient appointments and teaching sessions
- Act as a liaison between the steering committees and medical school staff regarding student completion of requirements



FUNDRAISING & FINANCE

- Manage the clinic budget and monitor fundraising income and expenses
- Coordinate fundraising efforts within the community with the goal to reach financial sustainability and continue providing patients with free healthcare
