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Orthopedic Surgery Summer Immersion Program

This summer, the Orthopaedic Surgery Interest Group (OSIG) at RWJMS successfully hosted its **Third Annual** M2 **Orthopedic Surgery Summer Immersion Program**, marking a significant milestone in the continued growth of this initiative. The program garnered **international interest**, receiving applications from medical schools across the United States and beyond, with 11 students ultimately selected to participate.





Coordinated by **OSIG's Vice President Dan Devine**, this year's program offered an immersive two-week experience, meticulously planned over six months with the guidance of Chief Resident **Jomar Aryee** and faculty advisor **Dr. Brian Katt**. The program provided a comprehensive exposure to the daily life of an orthopedic surgeon, blending clinical practice with educational activities.

Participants engaged in a variety of orthopaedic subspecialties, attending fracture conferences, grand rounds, and evening journal clubs. Hands-on learning was emphasized through bioskills workshops, including sawbones sessions, which allowed students to practice and refine their surgical techniques. The program also facilitated informal networking through social events, such as a student social dinner and a resident Q&A session, helping participants forge valuable connections with mentors.





Feedback from the participants was overwhelmingly positive, with students **rating the program 9.3 out of 10** for **meaningful exposure** to orthopaedic surgery and **9.54 out of 10** in **recommending the program to future students**. Notably, 100% of the participants connected with an orthopedic mentor during the program, underscoring the program's success in fostering mentorship and guidance.



As OSIG looks forward to future iterations, the success of this year's Summer Immersion Program reaffirms our commitment to providing enriching opportunities that inspire and prepare the next generation of orthopedic surgeons.



Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Department of Orthopaedic Surgery Sub-I Bootcamp


In May 2024, the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School (RWJMS) hosted its fourth iteration of the **Orthopaedic Surgery Sub-I Bootcamp**. Spearheaded in 2021 by **Dr. Thomas McPartland**, this boot camp was specifically crafted to **prepare fourth-year medical students for their orthopedic surgery sub-internships**.

As orthopedic surgery remains one of the most competitive specialties, applicants must excel in various objective measures, including Step 2 scores, AOA status, and research contributions. **Recently, performance during fourth-year clinical rotations, known as subinternships or "away rotations," has become a new subjective measure**. These rotations provide both the applicants and the hosting residency programs with an opportunity to assess whether they are a "good fit". Program directors and residents evaluate applicants' orthopedic knowledge, clinical skills, work ethic, and personality. Given the limited orthopedic training and clinical exposure available during medical school, adequate **preparation for these rotations is crucial for applicants'** success.

To address this need, the RWJMS Orthopaedic Surgery Sub-I Bootcamp was designed to equip students with essential foundational knowledge and technical skills. Over four days, the boot camp offered a **robust curriculum** that combined didactic lectures, hands-on simulation training with real-time feedback, and case-based discussions. **The schedule was as follows:**

Feedback from participants showed **significant improvements** in their **self-reported confidence** and **competence in orthopedic skills**. Additionally, participants reported improvements in their knowledge of surgical anatomical concepts, orthopedic implants, imaging interpretation, and trauma assessment.

The success of the Sub-I Bootcamp underscores the importance of such preparatory programs in **bridging the gap between medical education and residency**. By providing targeted, immersive training, the RWJMS Orthopedic Surgery Sub-I Bootcamp ensures that our fourth-year students can tackle their away rotations with the confidence and competence necessary to increase their chances of matching in the desired programs!
