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Year-in-Review

“What started out as several lunch lectures a year has blossomed into a community of dedicated students and faculty committed to bringing experiences to students”

In 2023, OSIG held a total of **26 events** ranging from research panels, to learning about orthopaedic principles, to lectures on how to match into Orthopaedic residency. OSIG hosted **6 bioskills workshops** including suture workshops, cadaver and sawbones workshops with companies like Stryker and b-One, splinting/casting labs, and even a virtual reality surgical simulation with Osso VR!



OSIG also held several informal networking events with Rutgers faculty and residents at our annual 5K and Tailgate events. The inaugural **Women In Ortho Panel** brought women orthopaedic surgeons from Rutgers and other institutions to campus for a networking dinner with students.

During this past year, OSIG expanded the **Summer Immersion Program** and received overwhelmingly positive feedback on helping rising M2 students get early exposure to the academic and clinical components of the residency program here at RWJUH. Our **Orthopaedics M4 Bootcamp** ensured that students were adequately equipped to stand out in their elective rotations as well as sub-internships, leaving positive lasting impressions on their future programs.



OSIG currently has **111 members** between all four medical student classes. In the past year, we expanded our alumni network from 30 to over **100 alumni** contacts all across the country, to ensure current RWJ students can connect, network and learn from RWJ alum in orthopaedics.

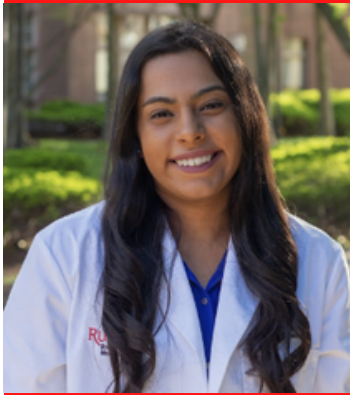
