







Our Model


Continuity of Care



A WORD FROM A FACULTY ADVISOR

The HIPHOP-Promise Clinic was established in 2005, resulting from the needs assessment of health care access of Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen patrons. This clinic provides longitudinal primary care to uninsured homeless people in New Brunswick, as well as strengthened the service-learning curriculum to excel in medical professionalism. Nineteen years later, the gap in healthcare continues, the complexity of medical, mental, and social issues exaggerated, the cost skyrocketed; we remain committed to our mission through volunteer students, students of Schools of Pharmacy and Social Work, residents of Family Medicine and Psychiatry, licensed physician preceptors, to provide care to the population.

Congratulation to Dr. Patrick Wong, who received a 2024 Volunteer Faculty Award. He is one of the preceptors at Promise Clinic, a graduate of Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and Family Medicine Residency in New Brunswick, NJ. Dr. Wong has been a role model for medical students rotated at his office in Edison, provides compassionate patient-centered care and dedicated to medical education and the community. We greatly appreciate all preceptors from Emergency Medicine, Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, IM-Pediatrics for teaching student doctors (list on p.6).

Our patients receive free care, medications and supplies with support from Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, charity care agreement of hospitals, indigent patient laboratory service agreement, patient assistance program of pharmaceutical companies, and generous donations from organizations and individuals.

During 2023-2024, a gift from the Dermatological Society of New Jersey, initiated by students Cristina Ricco and Isabella Tan and supported by Dr. Amy Pappert, helped fund the delivery of dermatological consultations with patients via Zoom with Dr. Pappert or in person with Dr. Annie Truss, as well as enhanced

dermatology education for medical students, and covered the expense of commonly used medication.

A grant from New Jersey Health Foundation for "Diabetes Action Plan" allows us to provide self-monitoring glucometer and supplies, blood pressure equipment, Fitbit, nutritional counseling and gift cards to patients with diabetes.

Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen

Recipients of Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen services are eligible, and actively recruited, for care at the Promise Clinic. Elijah's Promise is a dynamic organization that helps low-income individuals by providing nutritious meals, a broad range of social services, culinary arts training, and health screenings. Elijah's Promise has been a wonderful partner and advocate for the community. Students staff a booth at the community kitchen twice a week to provide blood pressure screenings. Our student-doctors also provide health education for the members of the community through teaching sessions. Our partnership with Elijah's Promise enables community members to engage in health maintenance activities and to monitor their health weekly.




Medication usage



VeggieRx is under way to provide healthy fruits and vegetables to New Brunswick’s poor and low-income residents. More than a lifeline to food, the program also helps to create awareness about the connections between food and health, and it provides tangible ways for residents to take care of their health. Established in 2018, VeggieRx represents a partnership among several health-oriented community programs that serve the city’s most vulnerable residents: New Brunswick Community Farmers’ Market, Robert Wood Johnson Medical School’s HIPHOP-Promise Clinic, and Elijah’s Promise Community Soup Kitchen.

STUDENT REFLECTION

Service to community and country have always been among the values which I hold highest in life. Like many of my service-minded colleagues, I was initially drawn to the Promise Clinic by its mission of attending to the needs of the most vulnerable in our local community. In a special way, I saw my participation in clinic as an opportunity to give back to New Brunswick, the city which I had called home for the four years of my undergraduate education at Rutgers. Excited to apply my growing knowledge and skillset to the benefit of patients, I jumped headfirst into clinic as a first-year student in 2017, joining as both a Student Doctor and Steering Committee Member assigned to the Laboratory Sub-Committee. Over my seven-year tenure, I have been blessed with the opportunity to see Promise Clinic grow, evolve, and adapt to the most difficult of circumstances. In reflecting on this experience and the many successes of Promise Clinic, the one common factor that shines through is the people: the countless individuals whose unwavering dedication and humility make it all possible.

Through the devastation of COVID-19, a much-needed light was shone on the healthcare system and the professionals who stand on the frontline of life and death each day. In a similar way, the challenges of the pandemic brought out the best in the Promise Clinic team. Amidst the uncertainty facing their own lives and education, students exceeded their responsibilities, meeting regularly to develop contingency plans for their patients and, when feasible, implement a protocol for the safe return to in-clinic operations. I distinctly recall the cautious, nervous optimism that was palpable during the first clinic nights in 2020. Yet, the commitment of these individuals ensured that Promise Clinic emerged from these uncharted territories stronger and even more adaptable. Indeed, adaptability is exactly what the clinic would need for its next challenge – the transition from a homegrown familiar EMR to the new, intimidating hyperspace that is Epic.



I am particularly proud of my peers on the Laboratory Sub-Committee who, in addition to this transition, navigated an entirely new system of ordering and processing labs through a novel partnership with LabCorp. These memorable events highlight the dynamic nature of healthcare; thanks to Promise Clinic, we as students are better prepared to face the challenges of an ever-changing healthcare landscape.

The opportunity to work alongside such an incredible team is only superseded by the blessing it is to care for and learn from our diverse patient population. I often feel that being a member of the Laboratory Sub-Committee is one of the best jobs in Promise Clinic as, on any given night, we have the opportunity to engage with a number of patients. Often, we see them on a regular basis as they work with their teams to meet HbA1c goals or lower their LDL cholesterol. For a short time, we are allowed to share in their triumph and encourage their perseverance.

Diabetes Action Plan

Promise Clinic received a grant from New Jersey Health Foundation for the Diabetes Action Plan where student doctor teams will distribute blood pressure cuffs, Fitbits, and blood glucose monitors to track factors related to diabetes. Student doctors will monitor the patients' progress over the year and report if patients saw improvement in HbA1c levels from using these additional health-tracking tools. DAP is overseen by the operations and finance / fundraising committees. It was IRB approved and is led by Dr. Lin.



Medication Therapy Management

The Pharmacy Committee along with PharmD students conducted medication therapy management upon request for patients. This included helping the patient understand their medication list (what they are taking, how often, why, etc.). Patients were also given a pill box, had alarms set up for to reduce forgetfulness and ultimately Increase medication adherence.

SUBCOMMITTEES



OPERATIONS

- Oversee all Promise Clinic activities as clinic directors, managers, schedulers, and first-year representatives
- Act as liaisons between steering committees, student-doctors, preceptors, faculty advisors, and clinic staff
- Manage the flow of clinic weekly and collaborate to realize long-term goals for Promise Clinic



SOCIAL NEEDS

- Collaborate with the Rutgers School of Social Work and student-doctors to identify patients' social needs, including housing insecurity, food insecurity, and unmet educational needs
- Work with community partners to connect patients with local resources to alleviate these pressures with the goal of improving overall health and wellness



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

- Collaborate with Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen, other community-based partners, and other steering committees to facilitate patient recruitment and ensure patient follow-up
- Coordinate bi-weekly screening efforts at Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen and work to improve the health of the population by developing public health education materials and programs
- Organize clinic-wide interventions to target prevalent diseases by administering and analyzing the annual Patient Demographic Survey and encourage student-doctors to practice preventative medicine



LAB

- Manage all lab testing during clinic hours, including blood draws, urine samples, finger stick glucose, and other lab procedures
- Collaborate with the Middlesex County Department of Health to provide mammography, pap smear, and colon cancer screening for patients through the CEED (Cancer Education and Early Detection) Program



SPECIALTY CARE

- Work to increase the breadth of specialized medical resources available to Promise Clinic patients and to streamline the process of obtaining care
- Provide student-doctor teams with specialists' contact information and assist with the Charity Care program onsite



COMMUNICATIONS

- Manage contact with all Promise Clinic patients, including Spanish-speaking patients
- Keep in touch with patients regarding appointments and outpatient care, and work closely with clinic schedulers to arrange new patient appointments and follow-up appointments
- Serve as interpreters for Spanish-speaking patients and recruit others to serve as interpreters through a Student Interpreter Program



PHARMACY

- Provide patients with prescriptions and vouchers to obtain medication from a local pharmacy at no cost to the patient
- Provide onsite assistance to student-doctor teams in reviewing patient medications for potential drug interactions and side effects
- Guide teams in getting their patients into appropriate Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs)



QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

- Identify and target areas where patient safety is at the greatest risk, which includes overall clinic administration and specific team practices
- Improve the efficiency and production of Promise Clinic by using data from student-doctor visits to implement Best Practices
- Serve as a central source of information for many Promise Clinic projects



EDUCATION

- Make the Promise Clinic a model learning experience for student-doctors
- Maintain student attendance records for patient appointments and teaching sessions
- Act as a liaison between the steering committees and medical school staff regarding student completion of requirements



FUNDRAISING & FINANCE

- Manage the clinic budget and monitor fundraising income and expenses
- Coordinate fundraising efforts within the community with the goal to reach financial sustainability and continue providing patients with free healthcare
