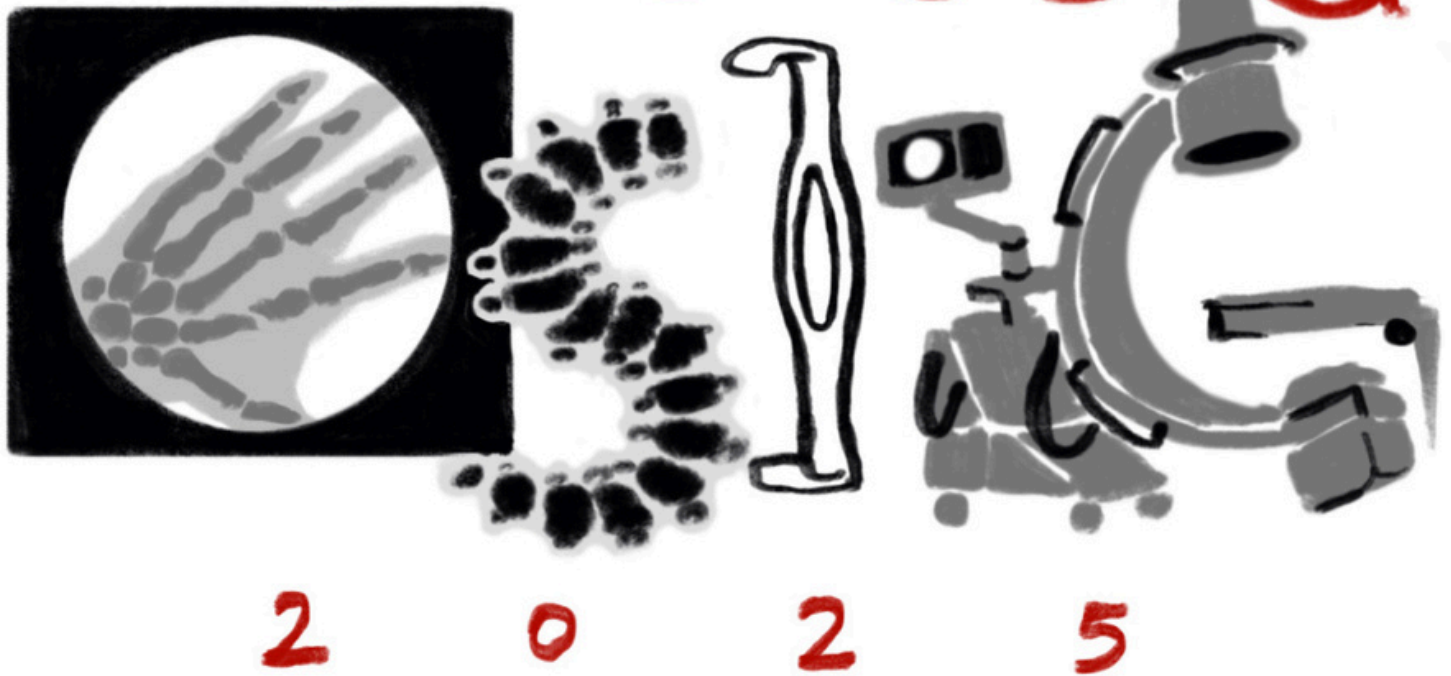

Year-in-Review

Over just this past semester OSIG held **17 events**, totaling **34 events** over the course of the 2024-25 academic year. This included a range of **educational lectures, hands-on workshops, social mixers, conferences, and immersive learning experiences** - not only for RWJ medical students, but also for our colleagues from partner institutions and Rutgers undergraduate students as well.



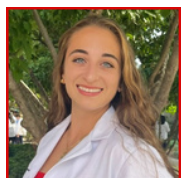
These events helped strengthened **cross-institutional collaboration** while expanding access to orthopaedic education for learners at every stage at Rutgers. We strive to carry this momentum into the new year and additionally extend a warm welcome to our incoming first-year medical students.



Year-in-Review

To kick off the summer, OSIG hosted the fourth iteration of the **Orthopaedic Surgery Summer Immersion Program**, featuring two separate week-long sessions for five rising second-year medical students exploring orthopaedics as a potential specialty. Led by second-year students **Megan Hsu** and **Puvin Dhurairaj** under the guidance of **Drs. Brian Katt** and **Thomas McPartland**, this year's cohort expanded beyond Rutgers RWJMS to include participants from institutions in California and Virginia, highlighting the program's **growing national reach** and appeal.

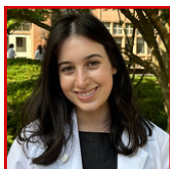

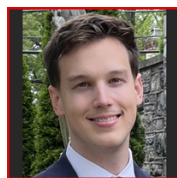

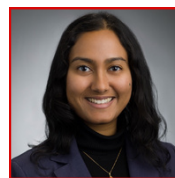

Session Two Participants

Throughout the program, students gained comprehensive exposure to the field of orthopaedics as they **rotated through clinics and operating rooms** across multiple subspecialties, including sports medicine, trauma, joints, and pediatric orthopaedics. In addition to clinical experiences, participants engaged in **resident-led educational lectures, interactive journal clubs, and hands-on workshops** focused on suturing techniques and the use of Stryker surgical tools. These immersive experiences provided students with both the practical skills and the professional insights needed to make informed decisions about pursuing orthopaedic surgery. Collectively, these opportunities fostered confidence, curiosity, and a deeper understanding of the specialty for our students.



Year-in-Review

With the start of the new year, OSIG welcomed **59 new members** from the Rutgers RWJMS Class of 2029 expressing interest in orthopaedic surgery. To help foster connections with upperclass mentors, OSIG, in collaboration with the RWJMS' chapter of the **Association of Women Surgeons (AWS)**, organized a social mixer where first years could ask questions about different specialties, and gain valuable tips for navigating challenges in medical school. A great way to foster early community, mentorship, and excitement for the year ahead.



To further support incoming and current RWJ medical students interested in orthopaedics, faculty advisor **Dr. Brian Katt**, met **one-on-one** with **31 students** across all years. These personal meetings provided students the opportunity to receive individualized advice on their strengths and areas for improvement - guiding students to become strong residency applicants when the time comes.

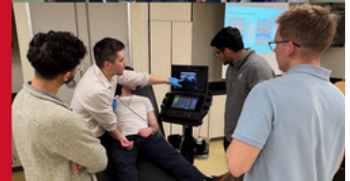

Year-in-Review



Since the start of the new academic year, under the guidance of second year **Regina Garvey**, OSIG hosted **3 bio-skills workshops** designed to help students strengthen their technical skills in controlled, hands-on environments. The series kicked off with an interactive **Suture Skills Workshop**, followed by an **Applied Anatomy Lab**, and **Splinting and Casting Workshop** all under the guidance of RWJ orthopaedic surgery attendings and residents. Highlighting the orthopaedic department's strong commitment to medical student education and mentorship.

During the **Suture Skills Workshop**, OSIG students from all class years had the opportunity to develop and refine fundamental suturing techniques using both suture kits and pig's feet. These **essential skills** will translate directly to success during surgical rotations and beyond.



Building on this momentum, OSIG also hosted a highly successful **lower extremity splinting and casting workshop**, with enthusiastic participation from students and residents across all training levels. During the session, students practiced applying short-leg splints and casts and even gained hands-on experience using a casting saw to safely remove them.



Furthermore, OSIG hosted an **additional 16 events** this semester including an Introduction to Orthopaedics talk by department chair, **Dr. Charles Gatt**, who outlined the key steps to becoming a competitive residency applicant. OSIG also partnered with the Rutgers chapter of the American Medical Student Association to host the **Second Pathways Panel**, giving undergraduate students the opportunity to hear from current medical students about their experiences at RWJMS.

Year-in-Review

OSIG wrapped up the semester with the latest iteration of its **Women in Orthopaedics Panel**, featuring **Drs. Christina Herrero** and **Jaclyn Jankowski**, along with PGY-2 resident **Hannah McIlwrick**. The panelists shared their experiences navigating the traditionally male-dominated specialty of orthopaedics and offered insight, mentorship, and advice to current female students in medicine. These are important conversations to continue, and OSIG remains committed to fostering dialogue that **supports the development** of an even stronger, more **inclusive orthopaedic community** for future students.



First-Year Experiences

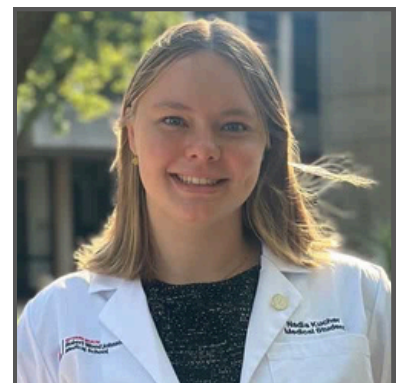

“OSIG has been incredibly helpful in exposing me to the field of orthopaedics by **connecting me with upperclassmen and residents** who were happy to share their experiences, advice, and honest perspectives. I’ve been able to shadow in both clinic and the OR, which has helped me understand what day-to-day orthopedic practice truly looks like and **solidified my interest in the specialty**.”

My favorite OSIG event was the **splinting and casting workshop**. It was a great hands-on introduction to basic orthopedic skills and gave me a better sense of how orthopedics blends technical work with clinical decision-making. **Getting to practice these techniques made the specialty feel more tangible and exciting**. I also loved the opportunity to talk with and learn from residents!

“OSIG helped me in showing me what kinds of opportunities exist for medical students to engage in orthopedics. For example, conferences, grand rounds, or shadowing opportunities. One of my favorite events was the **casting workshop** because it **gave me a chance to learn tangible skills**, but also **start building a relationship with the residents**.”

Beyond the group events themselves, being able to interact with classmates from **diverse backgrounds**, some of whom came in with prior orthopedic experience, was also a great way to learn.”

Working with our partners, we learned not only what supplies to use for a lower extremity cast or splint, but we also learned how to identify landmarks on the leg that we had just learned about in anatomy - a great way to **tie everything together**.”
